

Joinery and Building Trades Award 2020

Effective 1 July 2025

This national award applies to Pty Ltd employers and their employees. In WA it does not apply to sole traders, unincorporated partnerships, or unincorporated trusts. These enterprises are covered by the WA state awards system. For further information contact iradvice@mbawa.com

AWARD INCREASES 1 JULY 2025

Following the Fair Work Commission 2025 Minimum Wage Review, the wages in this award have been increased by 3.5%, effective from first full pay period occurring on or after 1 July 2025.

ALLOWANCES

Most allowances have increased effective 1 July 2025. Allowances are paid in addition to wage rates in this circular unless specifically stated as already included.

WHAT IF I CURRENTLY PAY OVER THE AWARD?

This circular identifies minimum wages only. If you are already paying above the relevant wage rate contained in this circular, absorption of the wage increase may automatically occur, and no adjustment may be necessary.

Types of employment

FULL TIME

Full time employees are engaged to work an average of 38 hours per week and receive all permanent benefits including annual leave, personal leave and redundancy pay.

PART TIME

Part time employees are engaged to work less than 38 hours per week and have predictable hours and patterns of work. Part time employees receive all other permanent benefits including annual leave, personal leave and redundancy pay. Part time employees are engaged for a minimum daily engagement of three (3) hours.

CASUAL

Casual employees are engaged for a minimum daily engagement of 7.6 hours.

Casual employees receive a 25% loading on top of their hourly rate in compensation for annual leave, personal leave, redundancy pay, notice of termination and other permanent benefits.

Ordinary hours

Ordinary working hours are 38 per week worked between the hours of 6am and 7pm Monday to Friday. Ordinary hours are scheduled over a 20-day cycle, with 0.4 of an hour on each day accruing towards a paid rostered day off (RDO) in each cycle. The modern award allows for an agreement between the employer and a majority of employees to substitute a RDO for an alternative day or reach an agreement for working other than the rostered day off cycle.

Allowances

Industry Allowance

An employee engaged on joinery work, shopfitting, stonemasonry or outside work must be paid **\$40.04 per week** extra to compensate for the disabilities associated with the industry.

A glazier or an apprentice glazier, engaged <u>other</u> than on factory glazing, must be paid **\$1.07 per hou**r <u>extra</u> while engaged other than on factory glazing to compensate for the disabilities associated with the industry.
